Year of Reading

As a school we have embarked on the 'Year of Reading' project, a venture alongside other local Primary and Secondary schools with a vision to build the profile of reading for our children. The launch took place in Cirencester in the summer term and has resulted in the appointment of our school reading ambassadors to help drive our vision in school. The project includes the opportunity to attend various events taking place across the year, including the Cheltenham Literature festival and Stroud Book festival, as well as projects taking place in school.

One of our projects, with Forest Green Rovers, also includes them running a football club for all children within the school at lunch time, which has had a strong uptake. This is then followed by a weekly reading workshop.

The first event this year was when class 3 joined author Natasha Farrant for a webinar workshop where they used their imaginations to describe a special place from different points of view.



Experience Harvest

All of the children in Key Stage 2 attended Down Ampney All Saints Church to Experience Harvest on Wednesday 27th September. The children enjoyed an interactive carousel of activities to explore the rich harvest of our land and the spiritual harvest of our lives. The children gained a fuller understanding of the significance of nature's cycles of growth, and explored Christians beliefs about how the spirit of God produces growth in character, in what the Bible calls "Fruit of the Spirit". The children visited a variety of stations before coming together to give thanks.

The stations were Harvest of the garden – Patience, Harvest of the ocean – Peace, Harvest of the flock – Humility, Harvest of the grain – Generosity, Harvest of the earth – Joy and Harvest Thanksgiving – Faithfulness.

Curriculum News

In science this term class 3 have started their electricity topic by following in the footsteps of Michael Faraday, who made a battery in 1812 from seven halfpenny coins, stacked with seven zinc discs and separated with six pieces of paper soaked in salty water. The children made timelines of key events in the history of electricity, then made their own batteries using 2p coins, foil and salty water. We were thrilled when we recorded a voltage from them on our multimeter! Prayer and Spirituality Day

Thank you Siddington C of E Primary School for inviting us to your prayer and spirituality day. It was lovely to stop and consider the "Wows, Ows and Nows" of life alongside you.

In Geography we had a global Geography lesson thinking about the issues facing some of the most marginalised communities in the world. Dr Liam Saddington, from Cambridge University, spent an hour with the children





exploring questions such as; "What is a country?", "Can anyone start a country?" and "What does it take to become a country?". We explored three communities, which are not recognised as countries and thought about how they are excluded from the international system. The children had fantastic ideas around the concept of community and governance and were able to present to each other on the issues facing Taiwan, Somaliland and Kurdistan.
