Achievement of the Earliest Civilisations

Key Periods:

Ancient Sumer – approximately +3500 B.C. – 2000 B.C. Ancient Egypt- approximately 3100 B.C – 322 B.C. Indus Valley – approximately 2600 B.C. - 2000 B.C. Shang Dynasty – approximately 1600 B.C. to 1046 B.C.

- Settlement
 - The four civilisations started at different times and were of different durations, but there is one period where all were building cities and their civilisations at the same point in time.
 - ❖ All four civilisations were around when Britain
 - All four civilisations were built upon by the edge of a river as this would have been important for trade, transport, cleaning and sewage etc.
 - All four civilisations built their cities close to the line of the Equator
 - Each civilisation traded items which they crafted; they all traded them with other places.

- Use a timeline to understand how all civilisations were around for different durations of time and compare this aspect of world history to what has happening in Britain.
- Collect and record information from secondary sources about what, how and where each civilisation traded.

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	 Look for the similarities between what each civilisation traded and make comparisons using own recorded information collected. Look for the similarities between how each civilisations traded and make comparisons using secondary information. Use picture sources to compare and make observations about the writing systems of all four civilisations. Use maps and atlases to compare where each civilisation settled and identify why they might have all built cities close to the Equator and near to rivers. 	
Learning Journey Questions Was everyone an Ancient Egyptian? How did the Ancient Civilisations writing systems compare? What information can we identify about what, how and where did each of the civilisations trade? What was similar about what the Ancient Civilisations traded? What was similar about how the Ancient Civilisations traded? What do you the four Ancient Civilisations have in common as to where they settled?	Prior learning: - Name and locate the 7 continents of the world and the 5 oceans Use world maps, globes and atlases to locate the United Kingdom.	Future learning Children will study Ancient Egypt – What were the Ancient Egyptian achievements and what did allow them to accomplish? In UKS2 children will explore the achievements of Ancient Greece.
