Unit Skills and outcomes

Remember and recall a wide variety of foods, snacks, and drinks (with their indefinite article/determiner) typically served in a salon de thé.

- To understand better how to change a singular noun to plural form.
- Perform a short role-play ordering what they would like to eat and drink.
- I can repeat, remember, and attempt to spell most if not all of the items typically offered in a salon de thé with their correct article/determiner.
- I can change a singular noun to a plural noun in French.
- I can ask for items I would like to eat and items I would like to drink in a salon de thé with high accuracy and confidence in French.
- I will learn about French currency and will use my knowledge of numbers to help calculate the bill in French.

Cultural Capital opportunities across the year
Children will learn about key figures from French
